





After a year's delay due to the pandemic, our Tour Chair Bill Carl jumped back into the fray, and put in many hours of devising and recording detailed driving routes, finding interesting stops, arranging for a host hotel, and searching for available meal facilities. At last we were ready to welcome our weekend guests for the Tour. Combining our annual Poor Man's Tour this year with hosting the ODMA Fall Tour Oct. 22-23, we had 19 vehicles and 33 people total, from 8 different AACA Regions. Per Linda Comontofski, who handled pre-registration, these were: Bull Run (1), Historic Fredericksburg (2), Historic Virginia Peninsula (2), Richmond (12), Shenandoah (7), Tidewater (2), Waynesboro-Staunton (3), and our sister Region, Queen City, MD (4). Our own Eric Kirk had the oldest car, his 1934 Hupmobile.

Members of the Board of Directors helped assemble the tour packets at the Board Meeting Oct. 21. Since we were showing off our beautiful valley and its charms, Chair Bill had a perfect idea for the "goodie bags": 4 varieties of local apples, plus water, granola bars, and candy. These apple-centric gifts were a big hit with our guests, who returned to our meeting room at the hotel to pick up more apples to take home from the bounty Bill brought. Wife Beth made decorative labels for the bags, and Dan Rowzie and a



friend helped Bill get the bags all stocked Friday at noon.

At 2:30 pm Friday, with sunshine aplenty, the group headed from the headquarters hotel (Holiday Inn) to White Post Restorations, where W.R. Thompson gave us a terrific personal tour of the operations. Before leaving the "Post", everyone had a photoop stop at the restored Sinclair gas station. Back on the road, the group took picturesque back roads to return to the hotel, includ-



ing a drive through the grounds of Long Branch. Since we were not able to secure a meal location for a group our size due to restaurants' limitations, the out-of-towners split up into smaller groups of 4 to 6 for dinner on their own, which seemed to be a satisfactory compromise.

On Saturday morning, we were greeted with partly cloudy skies, and a little chill in the air. An old-car tour wouldn't be complete without a mishap—and just before lining up to leave the hotel, one of our guests found the locks frozen on both driver and

passenger doors! Our intrepid Tour Chair Bill came to the rescue, and went to work with a wire coat hanger donated by another guest. The pressure was on—Bill had a large crowd watching and calling out sugges-



tions—but undaunted, our Bill saved the day! Only 15 minutes delayed, we made a scenic drive down the Valley to the Strasburg Museum, where everyone found something interesting to view, and several found something in the gift shop they couldn't leave without.

From Strasburg, we made a leisurely drive on back roads and through tiny villages, with only a couple of short hiccups due to misinterpreting the directions, and everyone getting



quickly back on track as we headed up the Valley toward Winchester. There was only one anxious moment, when one of the 1950s cars quit at a stop sign—but before everyone behind had even begun to pull over, the car fired back up, the hood came down, and we were off and running again. Seeing the line of antique cars ahead of us in a lengthy "convoy" on a straightaway was a lovely sight — it's been a long time since we've enjoyed such a happy view and the Fall foliage made a beautiful frame. 


TRUNK OR TREAT SHOW MILLER CROSSPOINT MOTORCARS

There were several Chevy pickups, but this green mid 60's pickup was the only one I saw of this vintage There were quite a few trucks on display, including this



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



custom Divco truck which was kind of cool. Don't see Divcos very often, but they seem

Driving Directions to Round Hill UMC

2993 Northwestern Pike, Winchester, VA 22603

Starting just west of Winchester Medical Center, from the intersection of Route 37 and Route 50:

- > Drive west on Route 50 (Northwestern Pike) for approximately 2 miles.
- > Shortly after crossing Nat'l Lutheran Blvd, turn left on Route 654 (Poorhouse Road). There is a used car lot on the left as a landmark.
- > At 0.2 miles, turn right onto Route 803 (Round Hill) Road). Independent School of Winchester across 803 is a landmark at this intersection.
- > At 0.3 miles, turn right at the Church rear driveway (Trinity Lane) and drive uphill into the parking lot. There is a sign at the driveway entrance.

Fellowship Hall entry is at the bottom level, rear of the Church, off the parking lot (no stairs).

If you miss the Church rear driveway:

- > Continue on Route 803 until it curves uphill and meets Route 50.
- > Turn right onto Route 50, driving east.
- > At 0.5 miles, turn right directly into the front driveway of the Church.
- > Proceed left around the building to the rear parking lot.
