is the MSV Car show (see banner above and flyer on page 9). The Museum had the flyers printed and they have been distributed by Club members at various local car shows/cruise-ins. Publicity Chair Art Bragg has delivered flyers to almost every car-related business around, and everywhere else car folks might pass by. Show Chair Dan **Rowzie** and his committee have been meeting regularly with the Museum, and all is going according to plan. Registrar Lorie Ruscito already has a handful of registrations. Since pre-registration isn't required, and registration is FREE, we expect a nice turnout that day - and the first 100 show cars to register get two free passes to MSV and a dash plaque (antique and modified cars must be 25 years old or older to be included).

HOWEVER, we still need YOUR help to make the show run smoothly. Club members are needed to assist with several tasks:

FIELD LAYOUT: Chair Bob Engle needs a few helpers on Friday planning the field layout and to put up the admin tent. He will advise of Friday timing at our July 11 meeting. If the tent is put up Saturday morning instead, he will need helpers with that early Saturday. Please be at the show field at 7:30 am Saturday to assist.

REGISTRATION: Registrar Lorie Ruscito needs a couple of hands giving out the show packets and taking same-day registrations on Saturday. Registration opens at 8:00 am and closes at 10:30 am. Her helpers should meet her

shortly before 8:00 am when cars start entering the field.

PARKING (show car placement): Chair Bob Engle will need many helpers Sat. to get the show cars parked in logical groupings. If you are helping park, please arrive by 7:30 am for instructions.

JUDGING: Chief Judge Mark Dinsmore will need several judges to select the winners (for example, Oldest Car, Best Antique Car, Best Modified Car, Best FOMOCO Car, Best GM Car, Best Chrysler Corp. Car, Best Orphan Car, Best Foreign Car), and possibly to help tally the Top 10 votes. Judging begins at 11:00am, so his team should meet at 10:30 am for instructions.

MEMBERSHIP TABLE: Outreach Chair Dan Rowzie needs volunteers to man the table in one-hour shifts.

WRAP-UP: Awards are 2:00-3:00 pm and the show ends at 3:00. Bob Engle will need help taking down the admin tent before leaving Saturday afternoon.

JULY CAR(s) OF THE MONTH



Jim Colville's patriotic three: red '68 Charger, white '66 Sport Fury, and blue '67 Coronet 500

When I submitted my patriotic red, white, and blue group photo for July for the club calendar, I didn't expect that it would mean I would need to do a short write up on each of the three cars. But now it's time to admit it. My red 68 Charger RT isn't red. From the factory, it was green, with green interior, green vinyl top, and white bumble bee stripe. Anyone who knows me knows I'm not a fan of green cars. Had it still been triple green when I came across it in the early '90s, I likely would have passed on it. It wasn't.

When I first saw it, it was solid black with no vinyl top, and had a correct-looking white interior. But the first time I saw it, it was for sale at a small local Mopar show, and it was priced out of my budget. I passed on it then, but luckily bias-plys. But it was clear from the start the car would need for me, it came up for sale again a few months later. The

paint was shiny, the white interior looked beautiful, and when that big 440 rumbled to life, I was hooked.

A buddy who accompanied me when I went to look at the car, picked up on the seller's situation. The seller had bought the car just a few months earlier (after the show where I had seen it) but hadn't cleared the purchase with his wife. One look at the wife watching from the open front door as I examined the car, and my friend could tell she wouldn't be happy if we left without the car. We figured my \$5500 purchase price was nearly \$2000 less than he paid. It was a strong running car, and I had a blast with it for several years. Took it to Test and Tune Night at Sumerduck

Dragway and ran the 1/8 mile a few times.

Enjoyed laying a pair of black stripes on the pavement in front of friends' houses while their



neighbors watched the smoke billowing from the red line

some restoration. The bodywork was full of mud, and after a decade or so of being parked outside, rust began to rear its ugly



head. For years I collected parts.

Then a Mopar buddy, who does body work for a living, agreed to take it as a side project to do in his spare time with the plan to make it a clean "driver" rather than a show car. Now, more than ten years later, the car is ALMOST



done. Almost every exterior piece of sheet metal, including the roof skin, has been replaced.



And now, it's red, with black vinyl top, and white interior and stripe, as I would have ordered it had I bought it new.

My white '66 Sport Fury, on the other hand, is the most original car I have. The original 318 poly under the hood has been rebuilt, but the 42k mile car has the original interior and most of the paint is original. Most important, it has always been rust-free. I was looking for a big block convertible when this one fell into my lap. I couldn't pass it up. There's just not much of a story about it. It's just a clean low-mileage car that was owned by a preacher in Tennessee. I found it in Culpepper about ten years ago.

Then there's my blue '67 Coronet 500. For years after I bought my red '67 Coronet 500 convertible, I wanted a '67 Coronet 500 hardtop to go with it. But the 383 4 bbl was rarely seen in a stock '67 500. Less than 4000 '67 500 hardtops were built with the 383 4 bbl. Most of those remaining had been cloned, or at least partially cloned, into Coronet RTs. At the very least, the body side moldings were almost always missing completely. It was much easier to find an original '67 RT with a 440, than it was to find a

'67 500 with a 383. Most of the 500s were built with the 318.

My friends tired of hearing me complain that I couldn't find a decent big block '67 500 hardtop. Then, this 67,000-mile Georgia car turned up in the vendor area at Chrysler Carlisle. There it was, exactly what I was looking for. It had a solid body, and the only rust was in the corner of the door. But I wasn't ready to buy a car. I didn't bring any cash with me for a big purchase. Didn't know how I would get it home, and well, I wasn't excited about the worn dull medium blue paint color. I was ready to pass on it.

But my buddies had other plans. The car was so solid, they all decided that it was the car I needed. If I didn't buy the car, they told me to never again mention my desire for a '67 500 hardtop. Further, a threat was put forth. If I didn't buy the car, they would pay the \$4500 purchase price and park it in front of my house in spite. These helpful friends insisted that I borrow the cash from them for the weekend and buy the car. One friend even offered to tow it home behind the rollback he had brought his show car on to Carlisle. And so, I bought the car, and followed it home in my Barracuda.

The car had been sitting for a while so there was a little work involved in getting it roadworthy. A new pair of bumpers, new upholstery kit, a new set of chrome magnums and red line tires, and later a fresh paint job from Maaco, and I was in love with the car. Since the car would be sitting outside, I figured Maaco would be sufficient since minimal body work was required. That was twenty years ago. I still love the car. It'll never be a trophy winner, but it makes me

smile every time I look at it or drive it. Now I just need to get a new headliner installed.

You ever experienced the stitching on an original dried-out headliner, come apart at 60 mph on the highway with the windows open? The cloud of foam insu-





lation blew around inside the passenger compartment, getting in my eyes, nose, and mouth. Didn't know what had happened. Looked in the rear-view mirror so I could pull over. But the mirror was black. Took a moment to figure out the rear-view mirror was useless because the headliner was hanging down behind my head. That was a fun time.

CADILLAC/LaSALLE NAT'L CON'T:



In the modified section, there was this 1947 Cadillac Imperial Sedan. It was shown to be 1 of a fairly low number produced. The owner has replaced the engine with a modern STS drivetrain. It sounded good when he started it up but was odd to see such a modern engine in this car.



FROM JIM COLVILLE: FORDS AT CARLISLE MAY 31

Van Armstrong and I went to the annual Ford show at Carlisle on Friday May 31st, as spectators. The first thing you notice at Ford Carlisle is that it's all about the Mustangs. I think it would be safe to say that 2/3 of the show field is Mustangs. Further, most of those are Fox body and newer cars. We limited our Mustang viewing to 1st and 2nd-generation Mustangs ('64-'73 model years). Even so, I managed to take over a hundred Mustang photos. For example, this '66 Mustang GT. The



white fastback coupe with the blue graphics may not look familiar to many. It's a rare (1 of 400 produced) Cobra edition. But it's not a Mustang Cobra or a Torino Cobra. It's a Falcon Cobra from Australia with a 4.9 V8, right hand drive and a body style only seen in the US in "Mad Max" movies.



Moving on through the show field, the rows of Galaxies, Cyclones and Torinos are always a must-see.







The '66 Galaxie XL convertible with a 390 under the hood was almost lost among a small row of '66 Galaxie 7-Litre models. The 7-Litre model looked like the XL but had a 428 under the hood. The '70 Mercury Cyclone Spoiler was one of several Cyclone Spoilers in the show. We learned the main way to visually distinguish a '70 Cyclone from a '71 is a difference in the side marker lights. The 429 Torino Cobra Twister was a model I hadn't seen before. It featured a large tornado style graphic on the rear quarters. It was one of only a handful built for a single dealership in Kansas City. The blue 1964 Mercury Montclair Marauder was one of two '64 Marauders in the show but was also





one of only a few '60s/'70s full size Mercurys in the show. Early Mercury Cougars are always a favorite sight at Ford Carlisle. My favorite this year was the fully loaded yellow '68 XR-7G with the 390, automatic, leather interior, sunroof and driving lights below the front bumper. Carlisle makes hoses available to those who want to wash their show cars and the owner was taking advantage of the opportunity when we first spotted this one.





More commonly seen early Fairlanes at Ford Carlisle were the pretty 1964 model sedans, wagons and hardtops like the red "Sport Coupe" model shown here. There were a few mid '69 Thunderbirds in the show, but I didn't see a single '58-'63 Thunderbird while we were there. The light blue '65 Thunderbird was a good representative for the mid-sixties Birds present.

Few Lincolns were there, but the customized '56 Premier coupe was the lone '50s Lincoln we saw. There are always several Edsels in the show, including this'58 Villager wagon. Most of the few pre-'50s cars we saw were modified. But the Model T on the show field was an exception.

It always surprises me how many Mavericks show up. Nick Dominick's Grabber is always one of the nicest. There are plenty of interesting cars to see to make it worth the trip, even for those of us not into late model Mustangs.



FROM JIM COLVILLE: JUNE JUBILEE CAR SHOW

Sunday June 9th was the 36th June Jubilee car show at the Martinsburg War Memorial Park. A friend had arrived early and posted photos, showing a decent turnout. But his photos also showed that a heavy rain had moved in. We decided to wait before heading to the show from my house in Berryville, but the delay meant we got there after the gates were closed and registration ended. As a result, we parked in a spectator area and walked through the show as spectators. It was a nice show in a pretty setting with lots of shade trees. FROM JIM COLVILLE: TIGERS EAST ALPINES EAST TOUR







On Saturday June 1st, Van Armstrong invited me to ride along on a tour with the Tigers East Alpines East car club for Sunbeam owners. The group gathered in Fredrick, Maryland with an assortment of vintage Sunbeams and other vintage and modern sports cars. Besides the Sunbeams there were an Alfa Romeo Spyder, a couple of Fiat 124 Spyders, a Marcos, a Mini Marcos, and a mid-'60s Corvette Stingray. Three Sunbeam Tigers and a '53 Sunbeam Alpine participated in the tour.

Among the modern cars in the tour were a new Corvette, a Ferrari, and an ultra-rare BMW Z8. And Van's wife's new Mini. Van's Tiger wasn't quite ready for the spirited tour of twisting and turning back roads to the tour's first stop.

We did our best to keep up with two of the Tigers and a blue Marcos. I will say it was a wild ride over mostly deserted country roads, but I'm pleased to report that no one received a "performance award" from the local constabulary. Everyone I met was friendly and I learned details about the Tigers and Alpines that I didn't know.

I knew that over the years from the '59 introduction of the '60 Sunbeam body through the end of production in '68, that there had been a number of

changes. After '63 the sharp pointed tail fins were replaced with more conventional rear quarters just in time for the introduction of the first Ford 260 V8 Tigers in '64. I knew that the corners of the doors were squared off at some point during the production of the body style. I didn't know that there was a change some time around '65 or '66 where the corners of the trunk lid and hood (sorry, boot and bonnet) were also squared off.

The first stop was at Eclectic Motor Company where a couple club members had their cars in for restoration work. One of those cars was, not surprisingly, a Sunbeam Tiger. The other was a little red Abarth that was sitting on jack stands in the shop. The shop



was small and consisted of two buildings packed with high-end classics in for restorations, repairs or new interiors. The only American car in the shop was a '53 Cadillac El Dorado. The '53 El Dorado was a unique high-end convertible introduced in the same year as Buick's Skylark and Oldsmobile's Fiesta. On the El Dorado, the convertible top and integral boot cover were a unique feature. This show car was there for a new convertible top. Apparently, there's now a premade kit for a rare car like this, and the operation of the top and boot meant a hand-crafted convertible top had to be made from scratch by the masters at Eclectic. To get it right and to make sure it was competitive on the show circuit, they had to calculate precise measurements from original factory photos. They went so far as calculating the correct meas-



urements between each stitch with nothing but photographs to work from.

Cars that were in just for interior work included a Delahaye, a mid '60s Ferrari 330, and Lamborghini Miura. In for total restorations were a '30s Bugatti that was nearly complete, a '50s AC Ace that looked to be ready to drive out, a rare '59 BMW 507 convertible that was bare metal, dismantled and almost unrecognizable except for the nearly 6' long front clip standing upright in front of the remaining shell, and a 1966 Lamborghini that was a stripped-down rolling shell.
