#### NOV. CAR of the MONTH:



Duane & Lynn Cookson's 1923 Ford Model T Pickup by Duane & Lynn Cookson

In October of 2018, I was visiting my dear friend Eric Kirk with the intention of purchasing some milled lumber that his father had stored for several years. I happened to see this red 1923 Model T pickup that his father had a mechanical lien on for many years parked in the barn. The original owner had passed away and the immediate family



had no interest or desire to have the truck back. As a result, I had forgone the initial purchase of the wood and brought the red pickup

home to the surprise of my wife. She immediately asked

what in the world was it and what was I intending to do with it!

I had never personally restored any vehicle, had no previous knowledge of Model T's and truly had no idea where to start. However, I did have some




experience with woodworking and decided to completely rebuild the truck body in walnut and red oak which I had been storing for several years. After nearly three years, the body was finished and the truck was pushed outside in an attempt to start the truck for the first time in nearly 30 years. To the surprise of everyone, especially me, the truck started after only a few attempts with some initial priming. The truck was running extremely rough and immediately oil shot out every possible gasket and seal. Virtually every gasket and seal had deteriorated over the many years in storage.

The truck was then pushed back into the garage to begin what I thought was a minor oil pan gasket replacement. Mind vou. I had absolutely no previous experience with Model T engines.



Expecting to simply replace the oil pan gasket required the complete removal of the engine. Which resulted in a complete rebuild and replacement of virtually everything internal. After many hours of watching various YouTube video and the purchase of numerous manuals, I set out to perform what initially seemed impossible. Working through the winter months, the engine was completely dismantled and rebuilt with new gaskets, bushings, seals, magneto and transmission bands. Along with a list of other items too long to list here!

initial purchase of chase of the wood and brought the red pickup ely asked results. Needless to say, we are both pretty proud of the final results. Short trips to church on Sundays have been a real learning experience in driving the Model T. I have since then added rear disc brakes and a backup electric fuel pump. I know that for those who are traditionalist, those additions are considered taboo. However, to make the truck truly road worthy, I felt those additions were needed



We hope to have many road trips over the coming years and look forward to attending upcoming car show events.

Well, at least the concrete was still clean before they hosted their first car show on Saturday September 13th. I went, knowing the limited size of the parking lot. I didn't expect many cars. But I was pleasantly surprised. Every parking space in their lot was filled, and much of the parking lot of the office building next door was equally as full of show cars old and new. The cars displayed ranged in age from an unrestored Model T to modern muscle cars. Kenny Harper brought the '68 Cougar he recently added to his collection.







Tommy Compher brought his 4-speed '65 Impala and posted a "Cam Strong" note on his windshield as a reminder to pray for Cam Duncan. For those who don't know Cam or his father Johnny Duncan, the owner of Full Throttle Customs in Romney, they have attended many local car shows over the years with their classic cars. A year ago, while a freshman in college, Cam was in a serious car accident that has left him in a coma ever since. The family asks for continuous prayers for Cam's recovery.

The 1906 Cadillac was the oldest vehicle we saw at Carlisle. The 1940 Buick Super 8 wore a subtle two-tone green paint scheme that extended off the roof and down the center of the hood and down between the two grille sections. The 1950 Oldsmobile Futuramic

88 was in the pavilion in the car corral.







I really liked the black 2-door 1956 Plymouth wagon. The 1980 Dodge Mirada was usually built with the 318 V8 or the slant six. This one came from the factory with the more powerful (and more desirable 360 V8). But even with the 360 and the optional Ttops, the \$17,500 asking price seemed rather steep. Over in the vendor area, there sat an interesting little yellow fastback coupe - a Puma, a VW based, Brazilian built, sports car never exported to North America.

A \$32,000 car I liked was the '66 Dodge Monaco 500 in the rare and desirable mauve (light purple) paint color. the Monaco 500 was a top-ofthe-line model with a big block engine, bucket seats and console, and real wicker interior accents. The lower rear quarters had clearly been "fixed" but the repair didn't quite get the factory contours correct.

Another \$32K car was a stunning survivor black '64 Oldsmobile Dynamic 88 4-door hardtop with 32,000 miles. The car was highly optioned and is documented to be a display car for the Detroit Auto Show for the '64 model year. Amazing original paint and interior, and low mileage, but still a high price for a 4-door.

Then there was the pretty turquoise '65 Plymouth Fury III 2-door hardtop. It was a truly stunning car, but with the 318 poly under the hood and bench seats rather than buckets, it will likely take a while to find a buyer at the \$32,000 asking price. The 318 poly motor's last year was 1966 in the U.S., and while they were great engines,

performance parts are almost nonexistent for them.



While the '65-'66 Mustangs were the most plentiful Mustangs at Carlisle, most were convertibles. If you were looking for fastbacks, it was the 1970 model year Mustang that provided the most choices of that body style. There were several 1970 fastbacks available in the car corral and auction.

#### FROM JIM COLVILLE: AACA FALL MEET - HERSHEY

For seventy years, the second week of October has drawn classic car enthusiasts from around the world to Hershey, PA for the annual AACA antique car show and swap meet. Over the years, the second week of October has also drawn rain to Hershey. But this year, the weather was mostly dry. In fact, the weather was actually quite nice. For those not shopping for cars, parts or memorabilia for sale, Friday is the day to attend. Friday is the day the cars roll onto the show field. Most of the vendors pack up at the end of the day on Thursday.



There were only a few motorcycles, scooters, and mopeds in the show. Of all of them, it was the red Indian motor- ticular order as I mostly wandered cycle that really stood out for me. Other than a few fire engines, the 1920 Packard truck was probably the next largest vehicle in the show this year.

The Original Class formerly HPOF] is possibly the most diverse class in the



show in terms of both condition as well as the makes and ages of the participant vehicles. The class includes beautifully preserved survivors as well as some barn finds showing some patina. Some of these Originals were the blue Avanti, yellow '75 Pontiac Firebird and a little Morris Minor convertible.







The remaining pictures are in no paramong the rows without staying within any particular class.

Theres always a large assortment of '55-'57 Chevys in the show. But this year a lone red and white '55 Bel Air

appeared in the middle of a row that was otherwise made up of all '57s. And two from 1960, a Thunderbird and a Pontiac Safari wagon.







The yellow Superbird was one of two Superbirds in the show. The big Stanley Steamer, with four rows of seats, was parked off to the side by itself.

One owner brought a collection of eleven 1942 model cars, including a DeSoto with its distinctive hidden headlights and a Buick convertible [Editor: was the collector Bulgari, who specializes in 1942s and Buicks?] A subtle two-tone green paint scheme adorned the











MG-TC. My favorite among the imports was the blue Sunbeam Tiger. It could be identified as a late '66 or a '67 model by the Chrysler Pentastar on its lower right front fender.



A 1937 Cord 812 Phaeton is always a showstopper. Looking big, and impressive was the maroon Deusenberg Model J.





There were several pickup trucks in the show. The blue '58 Dodge Sweptside was one of my favorites. Henny Motor Company built two Packards with targa -type tops in the early fifties. Both were present at Hershey.





First year for the front-drive Olds Toronado was 1966 and the red one here *[next page]* was a fine example of the breed showing off the fastback roof line it shared with the Buick Riviera.

#### FROM JIM COLVILLE: CHARLES TOWN SHOW AUG 30

Saturday, August 30th. Labor Day weekend, the last day of the threemonth period traditionally associated with summer vacation, and the day of the big car show on the streets of downtown Charles Town, WV. For the sheer number of show cars, this show never disappoints. It attracts a huge number of spectators as well. You do need to watch your step at this show as the massive crowd brings a surprising number of strollers filled with one or two little kids. Hopefully all those kids being wheeled around will grow up to be car enthusiasts.

Several of us piled into Van and Barbara Armstrong's minivan and attended the Charles Town car show as spectators. It was reported that there were 430 cars in the show and they were spread out along five blocks of Main Street and several cross streets. A nice variety of vintage and modern, stock and modified vehicles ensured that there was something there for everyone. I took over three hundred pictures and exhausted a camera battery before I was done.





The first car we came across was a bright red '71 Chevelle SS convertible. Parked nearby was an unrestored Model A Ford from California. The blue '59 Cadillac is one I don't recall seeing in the past. Next up, a yellow' 67 Stingray. My favorite of the Ford pickups was the pretty turquoise and white '66.







The beast in the next picture was made by tractor manufacturer Minneapolis Moline. The bright green paint on the '69 Road Runner was only available for a few months in the spring and summer of '69.





There were a couple red '67 Mustang fastbacks in the show, but the Peugeot 303 might be the only one in WV. The Hurst Olds hardtop in '72 used the Cutlass Supreme notchback coupe body rather than the fastback body of the 4-4-2. Looking large and low, was the white '66 Pontiac Bonneville convertible.









On the next page, a Model A Ford pickup in yellow, and the contrast of different eras of Mopars was evident comparing the black '51 DeSoto, with the '80s Chrysler Masserati TC and the '65 Barracuda.

enjoyable. But even when it's typically hot in August, the Charles Town car show is always worth a look even if you don't enter a car.

#### FROM JIM COLVILLE: FAIRFAX SHOW LABOR DAY

Once held in the historic little hamlet of Clifton, Virginia, the annual car show outgrew that little town. For several years now, it has become the downtown Fairfax car show held on a couple blocks of University Drive and a few sizable adjacent parking lots. The show attracts a little bit of everything, though muscle cars and Corvettes probably outnumber the exotics, and vintage American and European cars.

The gold Demon 340 was a nice example of a rarely seen muscle car. The '71 Javelin AMX is another muscle car that's not often seen. Next, an early Austin Healey 100 in a color combination that was seemingly tailor-made for the American market of the 1950s. The red '64 Corvette was sitting off to the side all by itself.









A Ford GT and a '55 T-bird. Neither had a back seat, but that's where the similarity ends.





There were only a few motorcycles in the show. Among the oldest was this '75 Norton.







## Driving Directions to Round Hill Church

2993 Northwestern Pike, Winchester, VA 22603

Starting just west of Winchester Medical Center, from the intersection of Route 37 and Route 50:

- Drive west on Route 50 (Northwestern Pike) for approximately 2 miles.
- Shortly after crossing Nat'l Lutheran Boulevard, turn left on Route 654 (Poorhouse Road). There is a used car lot on the left as a landmark.
- At 0.2 miles, turn right onto Route 803 (Round Hill Road).
   Winchester Independent School across the road is a landmark at this intersection.
- At 0.3 miles, turn right at the Church rear driveway (Trinity Lane) and uphill into the parking lot. There is a sign at the driveway entrance.

Fellowship Hall entry is at the bottom level, rear of the Church, off the parking lot.

If you miss the Church rear driveway:

- Continue on Route 803 until it curves uphill and meets Route 50.
- Turn right onto Route 50, driving east.
  - At 0.5 miles, turn right directly into the front driveway of the Church.

Proceed left around the building to the rear parking lot.


