When Van Armstrong and I headed to the AACA Fall National Meet in Hershey, I wasn't looking to buy anything, but I did want to see the car show. And, as a bonus, at least some of the cars in the car corral would remain on Friday, providing even more cars to see. So, Van and I went just for the day on Friday.











The Studebaker pickup was beautifully





restored; the '66 Pontiac Catalina was a super clean original survivor. But the little red '63 Falcon Sprint convertible with the 260 V8 and 4-speed was probably my favorite in the car corral.

For those who like '30s cars, the tan Chrysler Airflow and the red Hudson Terraplane awaited new owners. The early '70s Ford Courier was a rebadged Mazda pickup. The '69 Cougar was a rare and valuable CJ-428 model.

Towards one end of the car corral, was a coral '64 mercury Park Lane. We had heard rumors that Kenny Harper may have purchased a '64 Park Lane at Hershey, so we wondered if this was the one.



Inside the tent for the Classic Auto Mall was a Plymouth Belvedere convertible that reminded me of a line from a Christmas song ("Santa Baby, a '54 convertible too, light blue").





The Spanish red '66 Dodge Coronet convertible was very nice, but with the 318 poly under the hood, we thought the \$37,000 asking price was a bit steep.







Van liked the green '68 Mustang GT/CS, a Mustang model only offered on the west coast. The AAR Cuda was another inside the Classic Auto Mall tent. Farther along was another tent with the really expensive cars, like the bright yellow Stutz Bearcat.





The polished aluminum-bodied one-off custom was a 1932 Auburn Twelve Dassault Douze Special built by Georges Bigata in the late 1940's and was raced in France. I'm thinking the car, with its single big fin on the back, may well have been the inspiration for

the little metal automobile game pieces used in '50s auto racing board games.











Next, a '71 Challenger convertible in red, a 1942 DeSoto coupe, a '55 MG-TF (the last year for the TF) a '59 Oldsmobile in two-tone blue, and a Dodge M-37 Power Wagon.

Once a month, the Classic Car Group for Children, Inc hosts a cruise-in at Hagerstown Valley Mall. The cost to enter a car is \$5 and the proceeds go to charity. This cruise-in typically attracts 100 to 300 cars. It's the largest regularly scheduled cruise-in within an hour drive of most of our regional club members. I attended the September and October events. The September cruise-in attracted more than 100 cars despite the threat of rain across the region. The October cruise-in was the last cruise of the year and doubled as their "Trunk or Treat", and it drew well over 300 vehicles.







One of my favorites at both cruise-ins was the midnight blue '68 Barracuda 340-S fastback. The two-tone '56 Ford reminded me of one that club member Kenny Harper had for a short time. The yellow '67 Comet was a clean looking late '60s Mercury. I always respect Chevy owners who resist the







temptation to modify cars like the '55 Bel Air. The MG-A was decorated for Halloween. The 1929 Ford was modified, but appeared to be period-correct.





The candy-apple red on the Thunderbird may not have been factory, but

the paint was stunning. The white Camaro RS/SS looked 'stock' except for the wheels.





The paint on the Datsun 240-Z was a factory yellow that looked as though it would glow in the dark. The black '70 Road Runner attended from Shippensburg, Pennsylvania and threw the alternator belt on its way to the show. Repairs were made at the show and with a jump start from my buddy's Dart, the owner was hopefully going to make it home without further incident.

There were several '58 Chevys at Hagerstown including this two-tone blue sedan decorated for Hallow-

een.The red 1970 Ford Country Squire was beautiful and reminded me of the wood paneled Country Squires my dad had when I was growing up. .





The gray sedan was a 1951 Plymouth. A very stock and correct-appearing '70 Chevelle SS.





There are always several Corvairs at the cruise-in. The silver Corvair convertible was a turbocharged Corsa model. Parked near the other Corvairs was a Corvair Greenbriar van.

[Top right] A red and white Ford and a two-tone green Pontiac from the class of '57. Then a '64 Mercury Comet Caliente parked next to a nice step-side Chevy C-10 pickup.







Next, a sweet little 340 4-speed '70 Dart Swinger.



I encourage everyone to plan to check out the 2026 Hagerstown Valley Mall cruise-ins. But, if you're trailering your showpiece in, don't expect to park the entire rig inside the designated show area.

FROM JIM COLVILLE: ROCKVILLE SHOW OCT 2025

In the mid-Atlantic region, October is always the busiest month for classic car shows. In addition to multitudes of small local car shows, there's also numerous large regional events that we car enthusiasts have to choose from.

The first weekend of October is, of course, Fall Carlisle. Then there's the second week of October, and of course everyone's favorite, Fall Hershey.

But then we get to the third weekend of October. That weekend is the big antique car show at historic Glenview Mansion at the Rockville Civic Center in Rockville, Maryland. This show has been an annual event since 1962, and there are no other big regional car events to tempt potential participants away. The show is for "stock" antique cars, so in ways it is very much like the AACA car show at Hershey.

It does have a vendor swap meet area, though it's not very big and mostly includes vendors selling Maryland and Virginia license plates, automotive literature, metal signs, and toy cars. But there are more notable differences.

First, it's smaller. Six hundred cars preregistered for Rockville. That's much less than Hershey, but still, a very respectable number. Another important difference is that you won't see a large variety of early twentieth century vehicles beyond a large showing of Model T's and Model A's. Also, at Rockville, while the emphasis is on antiques twenty-five years old and older, they do allow some modern "exotics" into the show as well.

And that brings me to the biggest noticeable difference between the Hershey car show and Rockville. Rockville has a larger variety of antique cars. Yes, you read that right. The reason I say that is because Rockville draws more antique European imports than the Hershey car show. While Hershey attracts some European imports, Rockville draws more.

Van Armstrong, another friend, and

I, rode up together and went in as spectators. We started out on the row of ugly French cars. This year they were all Citroen passenger cars, like this dark red AMI Break, a station wagon model that had a production run starting in the early 60's and lasting well into the 70's.



There's never a shortage of Mustangs at Rockville. The dark turquoise '66 GT convertible was the one that most appealed to me.







There's always an entire corner of the showfield, up on the hill, devoted to



just the '55-'57 T-birds, and those first generation T-birds always fill that section up, and there were at least fifteen of them in the show like the red '57 shown here.

There's always an interesting menagerie of VWs at Rockville, including busses, campers, and many Bugs and Karmen Ghias. The Polizei bug drew the most attention of all of them.



Fiat is another European car line well represented at Rockville. The odd little Fiat 500 Vignale Gamine, was one of only about 300 built between '67 and '70 on the standard fiat 500 chassis.



When I worked for Bruce Hall at Applewood Motorcar Transport, I had many chances to admire the silver and black 1937 Alvis. It's a truly beautiful car. I hauled it a couple of times and on more than one occasion it was stored in Bruce's shop for months at a time between classic car events Applewood would ship it to.

The long line of Ferarris is often one of the most crowded sections of the show field. The Ferrari I liked best, was the black early '80s 400i. Parked among the Ferraris was a single interloper. A red early '60s American made Apollo GT was likely mistaken by some as an early Ferrari.





There were two Franklins in the show, including this tan '32. Next we have three little roadsters almost never seen in the US. The little silver car is a Suzuki Cappachino from the '90s.





The little yellow one is an early '90s Honda Beat. The red one is a 1998 Alfa Romeo Spyder.







Among the Rolls-Royces, one of the oldest this year was this two-tone late '60s Silver Shadow. There's always several 911 Porsches at Rockville, but

this red one is a 912. Rockville being a close in suburb of DC means BMWs would be out in large numbers, including this blue Bavaria.







The Lotus section had been expanded substantially this year with several Elites like the white one, as well as a few Lotus Sevens with their unique separate fenders. Most of the many Jaguars at Rockville were the pretty XK-E coupes and convertibles, but there was one black XK-120 that stood out.



When it comes to Chevrolets, it's really no surprise that there's a long row of Corvettes. But what some might find surprising is that beyond that, there usually aren't many other Chevys in the show







Driving Directions toRound Hill Church

2993 Northwestern Pike, Winchester, VA 22603

Starting just west of Winchester Medical Center, from the intersection of Route 37 and Route 50:


- Drive west on Route 50 (Northwestern Pike) for approximately 2 miles.
- Shortly after crossing Nat'l Lutheran Boulevard, turn left on Route 654 (Poorhouse Road). There is a used car lot on the left as a landmark.
- At 0.2 miles, turn right onto Route 803 (Round Hill Road). Winchester Independent School across the road is a landmark at this intersection.
- At 0.3 miles, turn right at the Church rear driveway (Trinity Lane) and uphill into the parking lot. There is a sign at the driveway entrance.


Fellowship Hall entry is at the bottom level, rear of the Church, off the parking lot.

If you miss the Church rear driveway:

- Continue on Route 803 until it curves uphill and meets Route 50.
- Turn right onto Route 50, driving east.
- At 0.5 miles, turn right directly into the front driveway of the Church.

Proceed left around the building to the rear parking lot.


