annual honorees. But what about the center of the trophy - the big wooden steering wheel? I was very curious as why this was such a popular accessory for these old cars. There was such a need that it created a market that had about 10 manufacturers of these Fat Man Wheels. The reason they were so popular was that they offered easier ingress and egress from the non-adjustable bench seat of the Model T Fords and others cars of that era with their very large diameter steering wheels.

The way the Fat Man wheel allowed easier in and out was different between the various Fat Man Wheels. Some would slide sideways (to the right) while others flipped over to the right and one flipped up to allow the driver easier access. Whoops, I just found one that swings down out of the way, while another actually swings out to the left, out of the car.

Some of the manufacturers were Neville More Room, Tiltlok, Spencer Fox, American Wood Rim Co., Lokwel, Bauer, Lazear and DHL. The beautiful Fat Man Wheel in the center of our Big Steering Wheel trophy is a Lokwel wheel made by Rollaway Motor Co., Toledo, Ohio. By pulling a pin the wheel tilts 90 degrees from its former position to allow for easy entry/exit. Flip that wheel aside and slide in. Let's go! See you in February, Dan

FROM JIM COLVILLE:
THE AUTO TRAIN

I have never travelled by train, yet always wanted to. Several years ago, I was at a car show in Florida, and spoke with the owners of a vintage Ford Country Squire wagon who took their wagon on the Auto train every year to cut out part of the driving to their favorite vacation spot, Cape May, NJ. I expressed surprise that they would trust Amtrak with their treasured antique wagon. They explained that they have never had a problem, that a walk-around video is taken of each car upon check-in, and that the car is only touched as it's driven on and off the train. So, when Amtrak had a sale on the Auto train, I decided to give it a try.

The Auto Train is a unique nonstop route as it only operates between Sanford, FL and Lorton, VA and it allows you to take your car along for the train ride. I decided to drive from my home in Berryville, VA to my family's place in Oviedo, FL, and just take the Auto Train for the return trip. The drive down was 14 hours, including two stops for fuel, food and bathroom breaks.

For the return trip by train, check-in (including car) is 12:30-3PM. Boarding starts at 3:30.







Once vehicles are loaded, the autoloader rail cars are then attached to the passenger cars, making the Auto Train the longest passenger train in the country. Available accommodations include "coach" which is pretty equivalent to an airplane seat, a "roomette" which is a private compartment for up to two people and sleeping berths, or a "room" which can accommodate up to four people and has sleeping berths and a private bathroom.

I went with the "roomette" which was actually rather comfortable for just myself. For those with rooms or roomettes, dinner and breakfast was includ-



ed and served in the dining car. I had the flat iron steak (cooked to order) with baked potato and chocolate mousse for dessert, but the salmon and the grilled chicken breast dinners looked good too (as did the cheese-cake and other dessert choices). The only hot item available for the continental breakfast was a sausage, egg and cheese biscuit, but there was also fruit, coffee cake, cereals and other cold options there on the table for the taking.

Despite having a bed, I could not sleep on the train any more than I have ever been able to sleep on a plane. So I was rather tired when the train arrived in Lorton about an hour late at 10:48 the next morning.

Little did I know that the experience was far from over. No sooner had we entered the terminal than they announced the locomotive moving the auto-loaders to the ramps for unloading, had broken down. They said broken down, but my guess is that it derailed at a turnout. They had to call in a big crane to remove the locomotive from the tracks to get it out of the way. The crane arrived a few hours later, in pieces on four semi-trucks, and had to be assembled. Once the locomotive was out of the way, it appeared that they had to repair damage to the track. The end result was that I didn't get my car till after 6PM.

I certainly met some nice people (other passengers) on the train and in the Lorton terminal as we all waited. The family I was seated with for dinner included three family members who went to VA Tech as I did, and the father was a new owner of a 53 MG-TD. The conductor for my train car made a point of knowing every passenger by name and was very attentive to the needs of the passengers. I know that my experience with the breakdown is not the norm, though I know delays are not uncommon. But, in my case, since sleeping on the train wasn't going to work for me, I won't be doing the Auto Train again in the future.

A LONG OVERDUE DREAM

Back in late 1963 my father received a phone call from his friend and Studebaker/Mercedes dealer McLoughlin Motors in Rome, NY. Mr. McLoughlin just received their first Studebaker Avanti and was excited to have my dad come out and drive it. I was always a tag along with Dad on all things electrical or mechanical and especially cars. My father was a Studebaker-Packard man until they went under and then drove Dodges for many years after.

With 4 hungry kids and two jobs a new 4 passenger Avanti was never going to be in his driveway anytime soon. Dad and I went down to the dealership and out in front was a Fawn Gold 63 Avanti R2 (The R2 cars were all Supercharged). Dad and I along with the owner took off for a test drive, and about 10 minutes into the drive Mr. McLoughlin looked at Dad and said, "Put your foot into it, Johnny". All I can remember about the ride was being slid from one side of the back seat to the other as the car did several fish-tails. I can still remember seeing twin 6 or 8-foot black tire marks in the road, I guess Dad was checking out the standard posi-traction rear axle.

From that day on my love for the Avanti was etched in my brain. Years later when I had my driver's license my father told me that was not the car for me and said, "They ride like a brick!"



Well it's been 58 years later, three kids through college and retirement restlessness setting in I finally have my Avanti. After looking for months and tracking down 3 known reputable deals, I found most internet sales were nothing but scams to draw your attention and un-load your bank account. I found the car through a Virginia vehicle broker and as luck would have it the car was close by in Hagerstown MD.



Lorie and I went to see the car at a private residence, love at first sight for me, Lorie just continues to let me be me....she's good at that.

FROM JIM COLVILLE: MORE ON THE ROCKVILLE SHOW

[Editor: those members with the email version of the newsletter have seen some of the many photos Jim submitted on the Rockville City Center show. Here are a few more delights.]

The weather was as perfect as you could hope for in mid-October for the annual antique car show at the Rock-ville Civic Center in Maryland Oct. 15. My buddies and I went as spectators, so the show started for us in the spectator parking where we spotted a couple of Panteras and a 55 Studebaker.





The first area we headed for was the vendor area and car corral. About half of the cars in the car corral had been brought from Flemings Classic Cars in Rockville. The Maverick was one from Flemings Classic Cars and was priced around \$35000. The rare Plymouth Volare Street Kit #43 was also for sale.





I don't believe that cars are judged at Rockville, but they are all parked by type. The Thunderbird section was our first stop. The 62 Thunderbird was a twin to one I remember my cousin having when I was a kid. I remember riding in his blue with blue interior bird quite often back then.



There weren't many Mercurys there this year, but the 57 Montclair, and 39-40 sedan stood out. From the SUV section, a 1st generation Bronco.







The Japanese car section was rather small, but there was a Datsun 240-Z.



In the Mustang row, the one Mustang that I thought was kind of special, was the pink 65 convertible. This was the very first car that was given to the Playboy magazine Playmate of the Year. This one was given to Jo Collins, who was the December '64 Playmate of the Month, and then was chosen as Playmate of the Year for the calendar year 1965.



Next was a row of Italian exotics. Most were Ferraris [Editor: and not all in typical Ferrari red].

Starting just west of Winchester Medical Center, from the intersection of Route 37 and Route 50:

- > Drive west on Rt 50 (Northwestern Pike) for approx. 2 miles.
- > Shortly after crossing Nat'l Lutheran Blvd, turn left on Rt 654 (Poorhouse Road). There is a used car lot on the left as a landmark.
- > At 0.2 miles, turn right onto Rt 803 (Round Hill Road). Independent School of Winchester across 803 is a landmark at this intersection.
- > At 0.3 miles, turn right at the Church rear driveway (Trinity Lane) and drive uphill into the parking lot. There is a sign at the driveway entrance.

Fellowship Hall entry is at the bottom level, rear of the Church, off the parking lot (no stairs).

If you miss the Church rear driveway:

- > Continue on Route 803 until it curves uphill, meeting Rt. 50.
- > Turn right onto Route 50, driving east.
- > At 0.5 miles, turn right directly into the front driveway of the Church.
- > Proceed around the left side of the building to the rear parking lot.
