



NOVEMBER CAR of the MONTH



Mark and Carolyn Dinsmore's 1977 Pontiac Can Am by Mark Dinsmore

In 2019, there were some guys in Dayton, Ohio who committed to buy someone's entire stash of three Pontiac Can Ams and a trove of Pontiac parts. These guys just wanted the parts and offered me all three cars for \$5,000. I thought it was a bit much at first, but they wouldn't budge on the price, so I decided to go for it. It took 3 weekends to haul everything back home. The third car was extremely rough, so that trip I just ended up stripping that car of every usable part and left the shell.

It's generally believed that 1377 Can Ams were produced for 1977. All were painted Cameo White with a shaker hood scoop and tricolor stripes. I had only painted one car prior to this project, a 1930 Pontiac and I painted it 'Hot Rod Black,' which is like a satin finish and very forgiving. At first, I was going to do something similar to the Can Am and call it the 'SR-77,' a play on the famous reconnaissance jet, the SR-71. I had a friend who was a professional painter, and he talked me into painting it gloss black, and I'm glad I did.

It took about a year to strip all the old paint, patch floorboards, take out dents, and do the bodywork. When I stripped it, I could tell there was some prior hail damage and the driver's side had accident damage. The entire interior, engine compartment and trunk was gutted, stripped and repainted with Rustoleum Satin Black. The underside had seams



sealed and was painted black as well, so none of the factory white remained.

After painting the interior, I fabricated a 2" dia. shoulder belt cross bar that bolts to the "B" pillars. This gives the car a race car appearance without a full roll cage. I also made a rear seat delete panel and attached package shelf out of 1/4" plywood and painted it satin black also. I got a pair of new racing seats and fabricated new brackets to fit them to the original seat sliders.

Hundreds of hours of sanding and polishing went into the exterior. Below, after primer sealer, and after

The powerplant is a 400 c.i.d. bored to 0.060 over, to make it a 412 c.i.d. The engine was already bored out when I got it, so I just cleaned it up, installed new bearings and rings and it was good to go.

The transmission is a 3-speed automatic that only needed the fluid and filter changed, then resealed.

Here is the competed dash wiring harness, gauge cluster and face panel. This gauge cluster originally had a rally clock on the left. I found a



good in dash tachometer and swapped it into the gauge cluster.

In July 2023, I drove the finished car 800 miles round trip to the Pontiac Nationals in Norwalk, OH. It was 85-90° heat all weekend. The car performed flawlessly. Of 600 cars in the show, the Can Am won 3rd Place in my class, and Poncho Perfection Magazine Editors' Choice Award.





What I like most about the car: It's a custom style build and no one else has one like it! It's reliable, runs great, and I can get parts for it at any local parts store!

FROM TOM WISENER: TOM & HIS JEEP GO TO HERSHEY

Most of you probably don't know me since I just joined the club earlier this year, but I am the guy usually wearing a Jeep hat and talking about my 1954 Willys CJ3B Jeep whenever I can.

My journey with this particular Willys goes back decades, a fact I am sure many of you can relate to. I acquired it back in the early '90s when we lived in Hampton, VA and the owner at that time decided he didn't want to continue with the restoration. He had a working 1948 CJ2A that originally belonged to his grandfather and decided one Jeep was enough. Shortly after that my employer (I was at that time a U.S. Army civilian) moved me to Syracuse, NY so into storage it went. After Syracuse we moved to Stafford, VA in 1995 and again it just sat in my garage. In 2002, my son and I drove to Toledo, OH and

TOM & HIS JEEP, CON'T:

picked up a replacement body and many of the parts we thought we needed to finally get going on this grand project. Alas, a couple months later he headed off to college and everything continued to sit in the garage.

In 2020, after having just retired from federal service and bidding the Pentagon goodbye, my wife and I moved to Winchester. We started going to whatever car show we could, and we are fortunate to have so many in this area, and the bug to finish my Jeep revealed its menacing face once again. That, and the fact that in Sept. my wife gave me an ultimatum – I had one year to either get my project going or get rid of the Jeep – I knew I had to get something done.



I realized I would never be able to get it done the way I wanted by myself, so I started looking for help. Old Jeeps don't show up very often at local car shows so I couldn't talk with other owners for tips or referrals, and, even with the internet, locating restorations shops was proving to be a challenge. Then, in Sept. 2021, we attended the Autumn Festival and Antique Car Show in Broadway, VA. After looking at all the beautiful cars and trucks we were heading back to our car and a certain business sign caught my attention. It was for W. W. Motor Cars, the sponsor for the car show part of the festival. The owner, Jack Wenger, was standing outside and we started talking. Before I knew it we were getting a personal guided tour through his building to see all of their works in progress. He said he could finish my Jeep to whatever level I wanted and the next thing I know, we agreed to him taking on my Jeep. On Sept. 21, 2021 they picked up my Jeep. And yes, that was exactly one year to the day of my

wife's ultimatum. Nothing like cutting it close to keep the harmony.

Over the last three years my concept of what I wanted continued to evolve, from just get it painted and running to getting it restored to as original as possible. I started reading Jeep forums, reviewing historical accountings, looking at numerous photos, and seeking out Willys Jeep events whenever possible. I went to Carlisle in the spring twice, picking through the old literature and original manuals. We went to Hershey twice, picking up license plates and some needed parts. This year in June we went to the Bantam Jeep Heritage Festival in Butler, PA, the birthplace of the Jeep. The American Bantam Car Company in Butler actually produced the first Jeep prototype, but the U.S. Army doubted their production ability and gave the blueprints to Willys and Ford for wartime production. In downtown Butler they had over 2,000 registered Jeeps lining Main St, it took almost two hours to get them all parked coming in from both ends of town. We left Butler and drove across to Kempton, PA for the Great Willys Picnic. In August we drove to Toledo, OH, where Jeeps have been produced since WW II, for the Toledo Jeep Fest. They had an indoor exhibit of different historic versions, military and civilian, and had a parade of Jeeps two across that lasted almost two hours. I now know why my wife says I have a unicorn, for all of the thousands of Jeeps at these three events I only saw one CJ3B like mine at each one.

Anyway, with Hershey fast approaching the pressure was on to make the final touches complete. Finally, we got the last part installed and touchups completed. On Monday, Oct. 8 we picked it up and on Tuesday we headed north to Hershey. Yes, once again I was cutting it close.

We spent the next couple of days wandering the flea market, but obviously we were looking forward to the big event, the show and judging on Friday. I wasn't sure what to expect, but the folks at Hershey had things running like a well-oiled machine. As we drove to the field, I was surprised to see all of the spectators that lined the route. It was like a big parade, and we were right in the middle of it. They waved and clapped, and one group even held numbered cards like in the Olympics (or Dancing with the Stars).

It sure felt good when they held up a 10 as we drove by. They got us parked, we pulled out our folding chairs, and the wait began. The judging team soon arrived, their captain introduced himself, and they set about looking over my Jeep front to back and top to bottom. I was a bit apprehensive as I had heard the judging team looking at the car parked behind us tell its owner they were making a major reduction for over-restoration (too much chrome under the hood), but our team looked, then conferred a bit and then moved on.

The rest of the day was spent talking to folks about my Jeep and also looking at as many of the other cars and trucks as we could. Before we knew it the show was over, and we drove my Jeep back to the trailer and loaded it up. That night we attended the awards ceremony. There is no way to describe how elated I felt when they actually called my name. First Junior! That's right, all that work to ensure everything was as original as possible finally paid off. My Jeep is a National First Prize Winner. I guess that bug has fully infected me, I am already planning our next year's vacations by looking for more shows to enter. I hear there is a nice one in Charlotte, NC next spring.

FROM JIM COLVILLE: FALL CARLISLE

The first weekend of October is always Fall Carlisle weekend. Van Armstrong and I typically set aside Thursday as the best day to go to see the most cars and a less than two-hour drive to the fairgrounds. That wasn't the case this time. In the early morning hours of Thursday Oct. 3rd, a northbound semi, hauling five-gallon buckets of paint, crossed the median into the southbound lanes and overturned near Williamsport, MD. That caused a delay for

round Shippensburg, we had to detour off of I-81 for construction, causing a second delay. But we hadn't realized that the return trip would be worse. Apparently, the spilled paint from the overturned truck caused southbound I-81 to be shut down for nineteen hours. It took hours on little back roads getting around that mess (one hour just to get through a single roundabout). Guess we picked the wrong day for a Carlisle trip this time.

But it was a beautiful sunny day and just warm enough for shorts and t-shirt to still be in season, and there's always something interesting to see at Carlisle. Parked right at the main entrance to the Expo Center was a pretty green



'51-'52 Chrysler Windsor convertible. Those two model years are pretty much identical for Chrysler products as no changes were made for the '52 model year. The Korean War caused a shortage of sheet metal and as a result, Chrysler was selling all the vehicles they could possibly make without needing an annual facelift to attract buyers. It was difficult getting a picture of the '41 Olds "woody" wagon due to



the glare from the windows behind it, but it was special enough that I wanted to include it anyway. Olds wagons tend to be kind of rare. From '50-'56, Oldsmobile didn't make any wagons at all, and from '65-'70, the only Oldsmobile wagons were on the mid-size F/85-









Cutlass chassis.

Canopy Delivery trucks like the green early '30s Chevy shown above were popular among produce vendors. Chevrolet was still making Canopy Deliveries in the late '40s long after most manufacturers had discontinued the body style. Next, a '68 yellow Triumph TR 250. The car in the auction I most would have wanted to bring home was the red '67 Barracuda convertible with the 273 V8 under the hood (the 318 wouldn't be available in the Barracuda until the '68 model year).

The 1968 Subaru Brat was a Japanese import with jump seats welded into the pickup bed to circumvent additional import tariffs on trucks.

There were two Ford Skyliner retractable hardtops in the auction, and another in the car corral. All, like the blue





and white one here, were '59 models. In the car corral, the Orbit Orange '71 GTO had me guessing. I had thought the color was only available on the '70 GTO Judge. Didn't know it was available in '71, so the car just looked "off' to me at first. There are probably more Chevys at Carlisle than anything else, including this '57 Chevy Bel Air and '70 Chevy El Camino.

FROM TOM PARKER: **AACA FALL MEET AT HERSHEY**

For the first time in several years, I was able to stay overnight for Hershey this year. Usually, if I make it for more than just one day, I end up driving each day and splitting them at different points during the week. Van Armstrong drove up on Thursday morning to walk the car corral and through the swap meet. While there, we connected with Jim Colville and several other friends along the way. We stayed overnight and returned on Friday for the actual show. According to the people we spoke with, there were over 900 cars in the show with 300 judges doing the work of the day.

We generally start with the Drivers Participation Class before heading to HPOF and working our way back to the front of the show field and heading out.







The first car that caught my eye in DPC was this 1964 Buick LeSabre

wagon. A very nice car that came to the show from the Virginia Beach area and featured the higher performance 425 nailhead of the time.

Other DPC cars that caught my eye included the fairly recent entry into AACA eligibility, Pontiac Formula and much older 1957 Chevy Bel Air.

A '37 Buick Roadmaster convertible phaeton. The little red woody wagon is a Fiat Topalino.






Directions to Round Hill Church

Starting just west of Winchester Medical Center, from the intersection of Route 37 and Route 50:

- Drive west on Route 50 (Northwestern Pike) for approx 2 miles.
- Shortly after crossing Nat'l Lutheran Boulevard, turn left on Route 654 (Poorhouse Road). There is a used car lot on the left as a landmark.
- At 0.2 miles, turn right onto Route 803 (Round Hill Road). Winchester Independent School across the road is a landmark at this intersection.
- At 0.3 miles, turn right at the Church rear driveway (Trinity Lane) and uphill into the parking lot. There is a sign at the driveway entrance.

Fellowship Hall entry is at the bottom level, rear of the Church, off the parking lot. No stairs to climb.

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
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
